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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT – Brian Harrington

Sea Turtles-- Sea turtle nesting season runs from May 1st until October 31st. The patrol team will be on the beaches every morning looking for new nests, marking them and monitoring them until they hatch. Help protect nesting sea turtles by filling in holes, flattening sandcastles and removing all belongings from the beach at the end of the day. You can also help by shutting off external lights for beachfront properties. Last season we had 20 turtle nests with 5 of them belonging to the endangered Kemp's Ridley species.



Diver's Paradise—The SS United States is currently undergoing remediation in Mobile, Alabama, as part of its transformation into the world's largest artificial reef. This process, expected to take 6 to 12 months, involves removing hazardous materials like fuel, chemicals, and plastics. Once ready, the ship will be towed to a location about 20 nautical miles offshore and sunk to a depth of approximately 180 feet of water in a designated area for artificial reefs.

Located just 1 mile south of Henderson Beach State Park, construction has begun on the **Poseidon Memorial Reef Project**, an ecologically designed artificial reef that serves as a marine life habitat, dive site, artistic sculpture garden, and memorial for loved ones. This is a multi-phased project that should offer stunning views of vibrant and colorful sea life amid a sunken statuary garden.

Fencing along Hwy 98--Eglin Air Force Base is currently installing 17,000 feet of fencing along the north side of Highway 98 across Okaloosa Island in order to address illegal parking on the right-of-way and pedestrians crossing the highway from south side parking areas. Eglin says the project also aims to protect habitats and species. There will be no public access points within the work area on the north side of Highway 98. Those seeking access to Choctawhatchee Bay can still visit through managed recreation areas including the National Park Service Gulf Islands National Seashore and Marler Park.

Tourist Development Councils--Currently in legislation are Florida House Bills 1221 and 7033. If passed into law these bills would dissolve tourist development councils by the end of 2025. They would also require counties to use tourist development tax revenues to reduce property taxes for residents rather than funding tourism marketing and development projects. As of this writing, HB 1221 had passed the Ways & Means Committee, Intergovernmental Affairs Subcommittee, and State Affairs Committee. It is currently referred to the Florida Senate Appropriations Committee. We'll keep you up-to-date on this legislation as it directly impacts both resident owners and tourism.




TRIVIA CRAWLER: ALL ABOUT COFFEE



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY - MAY

May 3, 1937: American author Margaret Mitchell is awarded the Pulitzer Prize for "Gone With the Wind"

May 5, 1893 - The Wall Street Crash of 1893 began as stock prices fell dramatically. By the end of the year, 600 banks closed, 15,000 businesses went bankrupt and unemployment hit 20%.

May 7, 1915 - The British passenger ship Lusitania was torpedoed by a German submarine off the coast of Ireland, losing 1,198 of its 1,924 passengers, including 114 Americans

May 10, 1801: The Barbary pirates of Tripoli declare war on the U.S. (interesting side note: Because of the hazards of boarding hostile ships, Marines' uniforms had a leather high collar to protect against cutlass slashes. This led to the nickname *Leatherneck* for U.S. Marines.)

May 17, 1792 - Two dozen merchants and brokers established the New York Stock Exchange. In good weather they operated under a buttonwood tree on Wall Street. In bad weather they moved inside to a coffee house to conduct business.

May 24, 1844 - Telegraph inventor Samuel Morse sent the first official telegraph message, "What hath God wrought?" from the Capitol building in Washington, D.C., to Baltimore.

May 27, 1937 - In San Francisco, 200,000 people celebrated the grand opening of the Golden Gate Bridge by strolling across it.

May 31, 1889 - Over 2,300 persons were killed in the Johnstown flood in Pennsylvania. Heavy rains throughout May caused the Conemaugh River Dam to burst sending a wall of water 75 feet high pouring down upon the city.


