OILA BOARD OF DIRECTORS 2025-2026

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By-Laws of the Okaloosa Island Leaseholders Association Article 1, Section 3

The general nature of the corporation shall be: to coordinate affairs between leaseholder members and the Board of County Commissioners in their role as heirs to the obligations and privileges of the Okaloosa Island Authority, to preserve the public lands on Santa Rosa Island, Okaloosa County, to advise and assist the county in the application of the protective covenants that affect leasehold members and to advise leaseholders and the public in general in their rights and obligations under said leases.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT – Brian Harrington

Phase 1 of the Santa Rosa Boulevard Improvement Plan is coming soon.

Five years ago the County's proposal to improve Santa Rosa
Boulevard became a highly charged subject with OILA. This plan was
originally born from the need to improve the sidewalks along the north side
of the boulevard. As the plan took form, a 14ft wide multi-purpose bike path was
included along the north side of the roadway, and this path comes at the cost of
reducing traffic lanes down most of the island. When this plan was first briefed to
OILA, the majority of our voting members took issue with the thought of reducing the
number of traffic lanes on Okaloosa Island and rejected the plan with a formal vote
against any lane reduction. However, it is important to note that at the time of that vote,
there was scant information available regarding critical details such as pedestrian and
bicyclist safety measures, improved storm water drainage, the possibility of
underground power, improved water and sewer, project funding sources, and a
construction timeline.

Over the following years and at OILA's request, representatives from Okaloosa County spoke to OILA on multiple occasions in an effort to explain the positive aspects of this proposal and were met with mixed opinions. Once the Santa Rosa Boulevard plan was finally complete, the County's Office of Public Works forwarded a copy to OILA's leadership and that plan was uploaded to our website for the membership to view--that was over 2 years ago.

As I have mentioned during our meetings, the County bore a responsibility to consult OILA regarding their plan—and they have met that responsibility. In contrast, it must also be noted that Okaloosa County does not require OILA's consent to place their plan into action, as Santa Rosa Boulevard is a county roadway.

At last month's Board of County Commissioner's meeting, Scott Bitterman—the County's Public Works Director, formally requested approval of a funds-matching grant for phase 1 of the Santa Rosa Boulevard Improvement Plan. This phase of the roadway project will begin at the Fire Station and end at Beach Access #1. Part of the agreement between the County and the State to secure this grant is that the *County has until October 31*st of 2026 to complete this portion. The cost of phase one is 3.8M with 2.8M to be taken from the half-cent sales tax reserves, and 1M coming from a State Appropriation Local Transportation Grant Award. This cost does not include the addition of underground power, which Florida Power & Light is working on separately.

Only after the plan has been understood, can one have an informed opinion. OILA's leadership will make every effort to engage with the County and provide updates regarding the construction timeline as they become available. In the meantime, members who are interested in forming a Santa Rosa Boulevard advisory committee to make recommendations to the Board of Directors are encouraged to do so.

8:21 PM – Motion to adjourn.






Nov 14, 1666 - The first experimental blood transfusion took place in Britain, utilizing two dogs.

HOW THE BRIDGE-to-BRIDGE PATHWAY CAME TO BE



The genesis for the Bridge-to-Bridge Pathway began in 2015 by OILA Past Presidents Dave Hancock and Kathy Foster and island resident Jill Higgins.

SAFETY was the primary reason. Although we also recognized the benefit to ecotourism.

The three of us met with and solicited support from the Fort Walton Beach Chamber, the Destin Chamber, TPO, Great Northwest Coastal Trail Corridor, TDC, Air Force Realty, DEP's Office of Greenways and Trails, bicycle shops, etc. It was after meeting with Okaloosa County Commissioner Carolyn Ketchel that the project gained traction. Without her support and that of Deputy County Administrator Jason Autrey and Public Works Director Scott Bitterman this path would not have been built.

OKALOOSA COUNTY TO UNVEIL NEW STATUES HONORING WOMEN VETERANS



Okaloosa County will pay tribute to service members on Veterans Day with an unveiling ceremony for two new life-sized women veteran statues that will be added to Women Veterans Monuments at Veterans Park.

The event will take place at 1 p.m. on Nov. 11 at the Destin-Fort Walton Beach Convention Center on Okaloosa Island.

This gathering will feature veteran speakers, followed by the unveiling of the statues that will recognize women veterans Nicole L. Gee of the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit and an Iroquois warrior woman who served in the War of 1812.
